

2020 - Trade Relationship NL-UK



- Trade with the UK contributed €26 billion to Dutch GDP in 2020 (the so-called added value of exports).
 That is 9% less than in 2019. In 2019, exports accounted for 264,000 full-time jobs
- In 2020, total exports from NL to the UK were €57.3 billion, of which €35.2 billion were in goods and €22.2 billion were in services compared to 2019 where there was a decrease of €6.1 billion (-9.6%).
- Dutch imports from the UK amounted **to €45.1 billion** in 2020, of which **€20.1 billion** were in goods and **€24.4 billion** were in services. In 2019, imports amounted **to €53 billion** (-14.9%).
- The importance of the UK to the Dutch economy has declined in anticipation of Brexit in recent years. Despite this, the UK will remain the Netherlands' most important export destination in 2020, based on the added value of exports, after Germany.
- NL is **4th investor** in UK



Conclusion



- Border Controls on EU side implemented on 1 Jan 2021, negatively impacting import from UK to NL
- Border Controls on UK side not yet fully implemented, easying export to UK
- Export NL to UK 2021 YTD grown versus 2019 with index 114
- Import from UK to NL index 120 versus 2021 and index 94 versus 2019
- NL has grown import and export compared to 2020
- NL has grown import and export compared to 2020 more than other memberstates EU27
- Proximity
- Other countries did less trade with UK and have moved their supply chains within EU27 instead of UK due to Brexit


Brexit benefits for UK



Losses more than **178 times bigger** than trade deal gains

Gain: 0.01 to 0.02% of GDP thanks to new trade deals

Hit: 4% of GDP from leaving the EU

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Issues companies



Top four negative aspects:

- Additional costs and reduced revenue: **71%** (NL=70% / UK=72%)
- Bureaucracy:**63%** (NL=54%/UK=84%)
- Delayed shipments: **59%** (NL=67% / UK=44%)
- Service sector, negative impact on the cross-border movement of people: **47%** (NL=33% / UK=55%)

40% of the businesses have seen a reduction in revenues:

- **10%** expect that they have written off more than **€100,000** (NL=11%/UK=8%)
- **15%** expect that they have written of between €10,000-100,000 (NL=17%/UK= 12%)
- **9%** expect that they have written off less than €10,000 (NL=6%/UK=16%)

Areas for improvement

In the goods sector these are the top 4 points for improvement:

IBCC

- Less paperwork, more digitalisation border formalities (62%)
- Faster customs procedures in the UK (60%)
- Faster entry for perishables (40%)
- More customs agents in the UK (40%)
- Increased capacity for inspections in the UK (35%)

In the service sector, these are the top 5 points for improvement:

- Less paperwork and more digitalisation (39%)
- Simplified rules for business travel (37%)
- Recognition of professional qualifications (34%)
- Faster customs procedures in the UK (34%)
- Simplified rules for migration and visas (31%)

Stage 2:

1 January 2022: Prenotification & custom controls for all goods

Stage 3:

- **1 July 2022:** All remaining regulated ABP and all meat and meat products
- **1 September 2022:** All dairy products
- **1** November 2022: All remaining regulated products of animal origin (incl. composite & fish products)






Triggering Art 16: What could EU response look like

- Targeted suspension aimed at a certain number of goods sucs as animals/pets

EU has always negotiated in sequencing. If UK creates problems for NI, it will have consequences for TCA.

EU position: de-escalate. But if UK does not stick to agreement, there will be a response.

Divergence: the next issue?

"So we need to reform fast, and those reforms are going to involve doing things differently from the EU. If we stick to EU models, but behind our own tariff wall and with a smaller market, we obviously won't succeed.

That is why I talk so often about divergence – not for the sake of it, but because it is a national necessity.

This project has already begun – though I would be the first to admit there is a lot more to do.

We are liberalising the growth areas of the future to open them up to greater innovation – in data reform, gene editing, transport, medical licensing and devices, Artificial Intelligence, and more.

We are making changes to the nuts and bolts of many of the core frameworks underpinning the economy to make them less bureaucratic and more dynamic than the EU regimes we have now left – state aid and procurement being prime examples.

We are phasing in our new domestic agriculture regime, while our immigration system has been reformed to give us much greater control over who comes into the UK and facilitate the shift to a high-wage, high-skill economy.

And we are conducting a systematic review of all the Retained EU Law which we have inherited, laws which never received proper democratic scrutiny before being implemented in the UK, and looking at ways to reform and change it so we can put ourselves on the best possible basis to meet the competition.

This is only the beginning."



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






Key Brexit milestones 2021-2022
